Manning the point during the offseason was Cameron Yates, a senior who will be entering his third year on

"Cameron will be a three-year varsity player and will bring a ton of experience," Jones said. "Cam will be our primary ball handler. He had a very good fall, he is scoring well, and he makes good decisions.

"He is a super smart kid, and it is finally clicking with him as he under-stands his potential and how good he can actually be. Right now, we have three captains and he is one of them. He will start at the point guard spot, he knows our system, and he has the ability to make a difference."

Another returning starter, Noah Arrington, is a senior also entering his third year on varsity. Arrington, primarily known for his "in-your-shirt" defense, has added an offensive reper-toire as well.

"Noah Arrington is our other captain" Iones said "Noah was a kid who stood out to me when I first got here three years ago. He understands the game so well, and no one will outwork him. Noah can also score the ball, and in the past, he was asked to be the fire starter, be the energy.

"He will always bring that. But what I noticed in the spring, summer and fall is he is scoring consistently. I think he will surprise some people with his development as a player."

Two other returning guards are currently in football, junior Tre Owens and sophomore Jake Bishop, who started at point guard last year as a freshman. However, both are not expected to join the squad until late December.

"Jake and Tre – and you can see this on the football field – are win-ners," Jones said. "Jake is a great ball handler, but beyond that he is a great leader. He is vocal, he will make sure everyone is in the right position, and he does a great job

of making his teammates better.
That's what I love about Jake.
"Tre just loves basketball. Tre played all summer with these guys, and he learned our system. He can shoot the ball, but his best asset is his ability to rebound.

"He was our second-leading scorer last year. We will be excited to get these guys, but since they are in football we probably won't get them until after our second district

Other second-year varsity players are senior post Smith and senior guard Hunter Vela.

"Ayden got a ton of experience last year," Jones said. "He is 6-5 but can shoot the ball. He is another kid - but this kind of goes for everybody on this team – who is a character kid. He and the others stand for the right thing not only on the court but in the classroom.

He is also one of our captains.

Jones continued: "I love Hunter
Vela. He is kind of like our sixth
man, but he can start. He is that good. Again, he is another kid who understands the game at the varsi-ty level, and he can shoot the three and he can play down low. He will be our top guy off the bench."

Blending in with the six return ers are six players entering their first year on varsity including senior Leo Bell, juniors JW Comiskey, Caiden Coufal and Truen Johnson, and sophomores Reid Dietrich and Max Newell.

"Leo Bell is a hi**gh IQ kid," Jones** said. "He is a 6-2 guard who under-stands the game very well, and he can also play the point guard spot. He is our secondary ball handler and he brings two strengths to the team – he is a great ball handler and he can rebound.

"Comiskey is a player who is always in the right spot and always doing the right thing. This will be his first year to play at the varsity level, but he has already shown he

Jones said Johnson, a post, is one of the team's hardest workers

"Truen is always the first one in the gym and the last one to leave," Jones said. "He has worked his way into a starting position, and I don't think anyone plays harder than Truen. He gets after it. He is an undersized post, but he makes up the difference with his effort."

Coufal actually played on var-sity at the beginning of the season before Bishop and Owens returned from football. He spent the rest of the season sharpening his skills on the junior varsity

"Caiden Coufal started on varsity last year before we got some foot-ball guys, and we sent him down to the junior varsity to develop," Jones said. "He is extremely athletic, a lefty, and he can score the ball. He can shoot it; he can drive it; and he is continuing to learn the system. We like his athleticism and his ability to put the ball in the basket."

Jones is also excited about what Dietrich and Newell will bring to the team.

"He is similar to Jake Bishop - he can get in and out of defenses - and we feel he can help us. He is very athletic and a good defender.

"Max Newell has a high IQ, and he is tall and can dunk the ball. He is also one of our best shooters. His definitely feel he can help us."

With his program taking posi-tive steps his first two years, Jones is ready to coach this team past

is ready to coach this team past district play.

"The goal is always to win state, but you can't talk about that until you get to the playoffs," Jones, who played in the NCAA Sweet 16, said. "Last year, we were a play-in game from getting in, and I think it left a taste in our kids' mouths that they got a chance to experience a playoff-type atmosphere.

"We had unbelievable support from the community, and a lot of people came out for that (tiebreaker) game. When we lost that game the kids realized how close we were, so this year the first goal is to be in the playoffs.

"I would love to say we will go three (rounds) deep or whatever, but the reality is that we just have to get in and anything can happen. But you don't get a chance until you get in.'

With his team trending upward, Jones is poised to take this team where it has not ventured in four vears - late-February basketball.

"Reid is new to varsity and another good ball handler," he said.
